Trustee Report

Trustee Report to School Council – January 2018

Ended November with 3 full days of **school results reviews**. They were very enlightening and there is some great work being done out there. I was struck by how much thought and effort school staff put into the education of all students and encourage everyone to read their own school's plan update.

Bill 24: An Act to Support Gay-Straight Alliances and Bill 28: The School Amendment Act received **Royal Assent.** None of Acts changes will be having a significant effect on the way EIPS operates; however, the transportation funding issue and review of the 2.4 km walk limit remain to be seen. The Minister stated that stakeholder consultation would take place in the new year and EIPS is ready to respond. Make no mistake, the total funding will not change so if funding is increased in one area, it will be decreased in another.

At the November board meeting:

- the board voted to approve the discontinuation of noon hour bussing because it was no longer financially viable. As a result, the board approved the motion to only offer full-day, alternating day kindergarten throughout the division so that all students would have the opportunity to attend kindergarten at the school to which they'd be designated for grade one.
- The board voted down a motion to discontinue providing free bussing to "hazard" students for whom we do not receive government transportation funding.
- The board approved a revision to Section 3 of *Policy 17, Student Transportation Services*, which discontinues eligibility for students taking the International Baccalaureate program;
- The Board approved the EIPS 2017-18 fall budget for the period of Sept. 1, 2017 to Aug. 31, 2018. The 2017-18 operating budget was originally approved by the Board on May 29, 2017. Annually, in the fall, the budget is updated to account for current information regarding enrolment numbers, revenue changes, staffing, expenses and planned reserve spending. In total, the Division's 2017-18 operating budget is \$207.2 million, which includes a \$4.9-million draw from its operating reserves. The reserves being used will support EIPS students and staff through the funding of an early learning program, student achievement initiatives, professional learning opportunities and various one-time expenses such as new school startup costs not covered by Alberta Education, new curriculum supports and the replacement of aging school equipment.

On December 4th I attended a **PD session** on Mental Health and Social Media—I picked up a couple good pointers there that I'd be happy to share with you after the meeting.

At the **December Ed Committee meeting,** the board received updated designs from the Wye replacement school architects, which definitely reflected a lot of the public comments received at the open houses and on the surveys. The next round of public consultations is scheduled for Tuesday, February 13th and Wednesday, February 21st.

We also reviewed the results of the calendar survey, which revealed a significant majority of the 7622 respondents preferring a

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November break over a pre-Labour Day return to classes.

- 64% parents
- 92% teachers
- 89% students
- 71% total

We were presented with calendars that reflected each of those options. Trustees looked at them and saw that there were opportunities to incorporate some of the suggestions found in the survey comments.

On December 12th, I chaired my first **Teacher Board Consultation Committee** meeting. The

meeting served to clarify issues, generate solutions, improve processes and offer explanations about the rationale of certain processes or administrative procedures. Many topics were discussed including the school calendar and the onerous field trip process. As the ATA representative on the committee stated, teachers in other parts of the province are envious of this unique opportunity for teachers to talk face to face with trustees and senior administrators.

On December 19th, EIPS trustees met with our EICS counterparts and Strathcona County Council. Agenda items included: the Municipal Development Plan, school sites, school zones and background information about both divisions.

At the **December 20th board meeting** the board approved the proposed calendars for the 2018-19 and 2019-2020 school years. We could not approve a 2020-21 calendar because the government has not yet released the diploma exam dates, but it should be noted that in 2019, Labour Day will fall on September 7th. This will make it impossible to start after and maintain fall break and will likely mean a return on September 1st.

January 11 & 12, the board went on a **2-day retreat** in Vegreville where we discussed many issues such as:

- The next division education plan, which will now span four years. We began work on the mission and values statements that will guide the plan.
- Transportation fees and service
- Academic programming
- Grade configurations

We did establish an Advocacy Committee to take a more strategic approach and not put everything on the board chair. I will be sitting on this committee and we will be meeting at the end of the month to establish our terms of reference.

Kindergarten registration opened at 6:00 p.m. on January 15th and over 500 registrations were received in the first 24 hours. This same online system is going to be used for all remaining grades with the new "**Pre-Enrollment Process**".

Annually, all EIPS families will pre-enroll their child for the following year. Each student will have the option to enroll at their designated

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school or select a non-designated school they want to attend—approval to attend a non-designated school is based on space. The process also requires users to verify all the student's information on file, such as addresses and contact information. The goal: Improve planning for both EIPS families and school's administration. The bonus: less forms for parents to complete that first week of school. The pre-enrolment and data-validation process for the 2018-19 school year takes place March 1-15.
