Student Drop Off

There is NO student drop off or stopping permitted in the bus lanes on Crimson Drive. Those lanes are a school bus zone and our school buses need to remain on schedule to get EIPS students to school on time.

Also, please respect the "Kiss and Go" zone located in the drop off lane in front of the school. There is signage indicating that there is NO PARKING from 8:15-9:15am and from 2:30-3:30pm. Please do not leave your vehicle unattended during this time. If you need to park, please use the designated stalls in our parking lot.

Saving for Your Child's Education

It's no secret, post-secondary education comes with significant costs. In fact, many families wonder how much they need to save and how soon they need to begin. To help get started, the Government of Canada offers families two education savings incentives.

- Canada Education Savings Grant: The government contributes up to 20 per cent on the first \$2,500 in annual personal contributions to a Registered Education Savings Plan.
- Canada Learning Bond: Available for eligible children from low-income families born in 2004 or later. The government provides an initial payment of \$500, plus \$100 for each year of eligibility, up to age 15, for a maximum of \$2,000—personal contributions are not required.

Once that child enrolls in post-secondary education—an apprenticeship program, trade school, college or university—the money saved can be used to pay the associated expenses. These include tuition, housing, transportation, textbooks, equipment and supplies. So, while it's never too late to begin saving, just a small contribution each year can translate into substantial saving later.


